Uprising Theatre Company tells stories that challenge perceptions, bring light to justice issues, and provide new ways forward.


Here's how:

I have had the honor of serving as President of the Board at Uprising Theatre Company since its founding in July 2015. In these first two and a half years, under the leadership of Founder and Artistic Director Shannon T.L. Kearns, we have achieved many noteworthy successes.

Our shows have touched on some of the most pressing issues facing our world today: Suicide and mental health (Son of a Gun), the rights of queer people (Who Has Eyes to See), sexuality and body image (Sex in the

Dark), mass incarceration (Prometheus Bound), and, most recently, women's rights in the workplace (These Shining Lives) — a particularly poignant topic given what we have seen unfold over these last few months of 2017.

Moreover, we have stayed true to our commitment to feature writers and actors representing marginalized people groups not often seen in theatre; we have encouraged others to tell their stories through workshops and events; we have engaged audiences in meaningful talkbacks; and, we have seen our shows challenge and inspire audiences to take real action in collaboration with the community organizations that have generously partnered with us along the way to make a difference in our local community.

As we reflect on the successes of these first few years, I wish to take a moment to recognize Shannon, whose vision and tireless energy continue to drive Uprising forward, and our Board of Directors, whose infectious enthusiasm for this organization remains inspirational. I must also thank the many volunteers, actors, and crew members who have brought their passion and commitment to each show. Finally, I want to thank our generous donors, without whom none of this would have been possible: We are so grateful for your generosity.



The Resistance of My Skin

Sex In The Dark was so popular we're bringing it back! With a completely revised and newly-titled script so even if you saw it during the last run there will be something new to see.

Ayden and Jess have been dating but they haven't had sex yet and no one can understand why.

Set in real time, Jess and Ayden are on a date where each one thinks that tonight might be the night.

Hilarious, awkward, and full of heart this play explores the possibility of overcoming fear to connect deeply with another person.

Twisted Deaths

Pam and Ryan couldn't be more different. He is a young transgender man and she is an 80 year old conservative but when they are both diagnosed with cancer their lives intersect in ways that neither of them could have ever imagined.

The Laramie Project and The Laramie Project: 10 Years Later

On October 6 1998, Matthew Shepard was beaten and left to die tied to a fence in the outskirts of Laramie, Wyoming. His torture and murder became a watershed historical moment in America. Members of Tectonic Theater Project traveled to Laramie and conducted interviews with the people of the town. From these interviews they wrote the play *The Laramie Project*.

Then in 2008, company members returned to Laramie to explore how the town had changed since the murder of Matthew Shepard. What they found defied their expectations. The result was a new play about how we construct our own history.

On the 20th anniversary of Matthew Shepard's death Uprising will present both pieces in reparatory, exploring how history is written and re-written.

Apples in Winter

Twenty-two years ago, Miriam's son, Robert, committed a horrible crime. Robert was caught, tried, and convicted of first-degree murder and has been sitting on death row ever since. In seven hours the state will execute him. As is the tradition, Robert is granted a last meal. His request: a slice of his mother's apple pie.

This will be a site specific performance with intimate audience seating in an industrial kitchen.
